Berlin warns EU-US trade war will spread beyond steel

Germany's Economy Minister warned that Europe's recovery and relations with the US were at stake as EU governments sparred over how to respond to Washington threat to impose punitive steel tariffs. [*Financial Times*, May 22, 2018]
